Diary of Events in 2018

Sunday 7th January – The Annual Winter Bird Count – Coordinated by Lin Pateman

A total of nine teams took part in this year's event which was won with a total of 81 species seen by Paul, Ian and Chris who entered as Norfolk N Chance. To finish the day tea and cakes were served in the Village Hall at Weston Longville.

Thursday 18th January – The Nightjar and other Woodland Species of Thetford Forest – Speaker Greg Conway of the BTO

The talk featured four species namely Nightjar, Firecrest, Tree Pipit and Goshawk which are all associated with the Brecks but with varying degrees of success. Whereas The Brecks are a regional stronghold for the Goshawk Tree Pipits are now red listed. and are the subject of several studies to find the reason for their decline. Doing slightly better are both Nightjars and Firecrests although both are the subject of further study.

Sunday 28th January – A Field Trip to Courtyard Farm and Holkham Marshes – Coordinated by Phil Borley

The weather was cold but bright and just made for bird watching. Tree Sparrows were busy in a hedge in front of us and while walking the permissive paths around the farm we were rewarded with good views of many familiar species including two wing tagged Marsh Harriers.

Later at Holkham many more species were added to the list and to end the day there was a spectacular sight of 72 Red Kites circling in the sunset before going to roost.

A total of 55 species were seen during the day.

Thursday 15th February – Driven Grouse Shooting and our part in its demise – Speaker Mark Avery

Mark started his talk by outlining the historical context of what is still considered a traditional sport and gave his usual impassioned defence for the protection of raptors on the moorlands of Britain. Parties pay large sums of money for grouse shooting rights and many landowners do everything in their power to minimise any form of predation although it is believed that there are only 7 breeding pairs of Hen Harriers in England. The evening finished with a lively Q & A session.

Thursday 15th March – Birds and Climate Change – Speaker James Pearce-Higgins

James showed how there is already a measurable effect on some bird populations of climate change causing heavier than normal rainfall and violent temperature fluctuations resulting in a lack of suitable food during the breeding season and therefore reduced brood survival. Climate changes are also causing warming seas which disrupt the food chain and reduce the supply of sand eels and other creatures that are so vital for many of our seabird populations.

Saturday 24th March – A Field Trip to Lackford Lakes – Coordinated by Alan Fordham

This trip to Lackford Lakes produced the usual varied mix of birds and during the day a very respectable total of 70 species was recorded.

Thursday 19th April - AGM followed by – Europe's Best Wildlife Weekends – Speaker James Lowen

The AGM business was soon dispensed with and we were entertained to a very interesting talk by James who promised to cram a year's worth of weekends into an hour. James tailored his talk for us by concentrating on birds but in fact he is a naturalist and interested in all living things and much of his book recommends places for their plant or reptile life.

Saturday 21st April – A Field Trip to Mannington Hall – Coordinated by Martin Spriggs

Mannington Hall is a new venue for the club and there was great interest in seeing what species turned up on the walk. We were not disappointed and a total of 49 species were recorded for the morning including very good views of a Wheatear and a Lesser Whitethroat singing in a hedgerow.

Saturday 5th May – A Spring Walk at Pensthorpe – Coordinated by Ray Gribble

14 members enjoyed the opportunity of a free visit to Pensthorpe on a glorious spring day. The woods were full of Bluebells and in the water meadow plants were beginning to show their full beauty. Although water levels on the scrapes were still quite high a total of 78 species was seen during the morning.

Saturday 12th May – Wild about The Wensum – Coordinated by Lin Pateman

This is a regular event in our calendar and as usual we provided a supply of volunteers to man the hides and help a steady stream of visitors to see the birds feeding on the scrapes and by the end of the day a total of 64 species had been recorded. In the marquee we had our Society Display erected and also we ran a competition for the children making and colouring paper birds for which we had a steady stream of participants.

Thursday 17th May – A Journey around an Archipelago – Speaker Patrick Barkham

The talk was by way of an introduction to Patrick's latest book on some of the 6200 islands and islets that surround the British Isles and concentrated mainly on 11 of the main ones He went on to show how difficult it can be to live in harmony with your surroundings and yet generate an income enough to survive. This was an enlightening talk about a subject that possibly not many people have considered in any detail.

Saturday 2nd June – A Field Trip to RSPB Lakenheath Fen and NWT Weeting Heath – Coordinated by Alan Hughes

The day started overcast with light rain but soon cleared and members enjoyed good views of several Hobbies hawking the numerous dragonflies and a Bittern stealthily fishing from a clump of reed. After a meal in Feltwell members went on to Weeting Heath where after seeing Nightjars in close proximity the warden showed us some moths that were in the traps outside. A total of 70 species were recorded for the day.

Thursday 21st June – Carlton Marshes – The Southern Gateway to the Broads – Speaker Matt Gooch

Matt became warden at Carlton Marshes in 2006 and has overseen significant developments since then. It consisted of just 300 acres then but plans are afoot to increase this to in excess of 1000 acres. The main focus now is to put more water into the landscape with extra scrapes and shallow pools planned. Already the benefits of this action have been felt with increased numbers of birds and wildlife in general visiting the site.

Saturday 30th June – A Field Trip to SWT Carlton Marshes – Coordinated by David Gibbons

To follow our talk from the Warden earlier in the month members had an opportunity to see Carlton Marshes before the main body of work to transform the site gets underway.

They were not dismayed and were greeted by a good display of various species both of birds and other wildlife.

Thursday 19th July – Summer Social – Coordinated by Mary & Keith Walker

Once again members gathered at the Ringland Swan for an evening of light hearted quizzes and good food and it was generally agreed that a good time was had by those present.

Our thanks must go to Mary and Keith for organizing the event once more.

Sunday 5th August – A Field Trip to Wheatfen Broad – Coordinated by Barry Pummell

We met at the Ted Ellis reserve at Wheatfen on what turned out to be a hot and humid walk through towering reedbeds and insect filled dykes.

Barry pointed out some of the many species that inhabit this special reserve including a Swallowtail and a beautiful Silver-washed Fritillary that posed gracefully for photographs on various bushes.

Thursday 16th August – The Great Fen Project – Speaker Henry Stainier

There was a lot of enthusiasm shown for this project after Henry's talk and it is certainly on the list for a future visit. It involves a huge area of peaty soils much of which is still being farmed in Stage 1. Stage 2 will see land grassed over and eventually water levels will be raised with the whole project taking 50 years.

Saturday 25th August – A Field Trip to Potter Heigham NNR – Coordinated by Phil Borley

Unfortunately a report was not submitted for this trip.

Thursday 20th September – Birding the High Andes of Columbia – Speaker Allan Hale.

Allan produced yet another entertaining talk with an account of this recent trip through wetlands and mountain passes to 4000m. Hummingbirds were a main feature this time with a different suite at every venue and each species adapted perfectly to their environment and feeding speciality. Many other species were seen including 14 species of Woodcreepers, Trogons and Toucans in what must have been a most enlightening trip.

Saturday 22nd September – A Field Trip to Blakeney Point – Coordinator Mary Walker.

After a meal at the Anchor in Morston we checked the Harbour area for birds before boarding the boat to go to the Point. As always there were both Common and Grey seals loafing around on the beach as we approached. We had 2 hours on the Point before being taken off so there was plenty of time to explore fairly thoroughly and a total count of 49 species was recorded for the Harbour and the Point.

Thursday 18th October – The Norwich Peregrines – Speaker Zoe Smith

The Peregrine platform has been in its present place since 2011. The birds do not build a nest but simply lay their eggs on the surface. Colour rings are used now and give much more information about the birds such as the fact that individuals do not necessarily mate for life. The talk was full of interesting facts and video from the webcam such as the fact that hunting territory can vary from as little as a square mile up to many times that when food is scarce.

Sunday 28th October – The Hoe Bird Walk – Coordinator David Knight

Unfortunately a report was not received for this trip.

Thursday 15th November – From Arizona to Alaska – Speaker David Mason

David has made many trips to North America and he shared some of the more memorable ones with us from Arizona to Alaska with the flora and fauna creating a memorable back drop to the many photographs of the varied wildlife that he encountered on the various trips that he made.

Saturday 24th November – A Field Trip to Cley Marsh Reserve – Coordinated by Lin Pateman and Phil Borley

In a biting wind ten hardy souls assembled at the visitor centre and set out for the East Bank and after varied success in the prevailing conditions refuge was sought in the slightly more congenial conditions of the hides to observe the various waders.

A total of 55 species were recorded for the day.

Thursday 13th December – Our Annual Xmas Social.

This year the Social was held at the Ringland Swan. In addition to the usual hotly contested quiz we had a meal prepared by the Pub staff that was enjoyed by everyone present. Our thanks must go once again to Mary and Keith for organizing the evening.

Saturday 29th December – A Field Trip to Sparham Pools – Coordinater Alwyn Jackson.

A pleasant walk around Sparham Pools included sightings of a Whooper Swan and 35 other species

The Systematic List.

This Systematic List contains records from the Society's defined recording area astride the River Wensum valley. Most records are *ad hoc* observations so the Report is therefore unsystematic and inevitably incomplete, reflecting observer interests, distribution and their inclination to submit records. Thank you to all the members who have contributed their records.

Records have been entered into the Society's spreadsheet by David Gibbons. The species texts have been drafted by Alwyn Jackson, David Gibbons, Ray Gribble and Richard Norris. The Systematic List has then been compiled by Alwyn Jackson.

The Systematic List follows *The British List: a checklist of the birds of Britain* published by the British Ornithologists' Union. Those species which are proven or near proven escapes are treated in the Appendix. Throughout the List the English vernacular name is given first followed by the current scientific name.

Each entry contains a reference to the species' considered local status and the following status descriptors:-

Vagrant	A bird well outside its usual range
Passage Migrant	Mainly a migrant in spring and/or autumn
Resident	Breeds and present all year
Winter Visitor	Mainly occurs in winter
Summer Visitor	Mainly occurs as a breeding visitor in summer
Naturalised	Introduced deliberately or accidentally by man and
	now breeds in the wild

Each species header also indicates whether the species is included in the "**Red**", "Amber" or "Green" List of *Birds of Conservation Concern 3 – The population status of birds in the United Kingdom, Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.*

"Red List" species are those which are "Globally Threatened" according to IUCN criteria, those whose population or range has declined rapidly over a twenty-five year period and those which have suffered a historical decline in breeding population.

"Amber List" species are those with an unfavourable conservation status in Europe, those whose population or range has declined moderately over a twenty-five period, those whose population has declined historically but made a substantial recent recovery, rare breeders and those with internationally important or localised populations.

"Green List" species are those which meet none of the above criteria.

Canada Goose Branta canadensis

Common naturalised resident

Regular reports of flocks of up to 20 from 14 sites.

Higher counts of 28 at Pensthorpe on 6th Aug (RG,LB), 30 & 60 at Sparham Pools area on 4th Oct & 30th Nov (SCh), 30 at Great Ryburgh on 18th Dec (BP).

Proof of breeding at Great Witchingham Common, Lenwade, Pensthorpe, Sparham Pools and Sparham Hall Farm.

Barnacle Goose Branta leucopsis

Mainly naturalised resident but birds from east Greenland and the Russian/Baltic populations possibly scarce winter visitors. Amber listed.

Records only from Pensthorpe with proof of breeding in May and June.

Highest numbers in the 1st winter period of 105 on 6th Feb and 246 on 26th Mar. In the summer months numbers were around 130 and in the 2nd winter period numbers had dropped to single figures.

Greylag Goose Anser anser

Common naturalised resident and passage migrant. Amber listed.

Records from throughout the valley with numbers regularly around 30 to 50.

Highest counts of 100+ on 7th Jan at West Raynham (IBI), 320, 150 & 250 on 6th Aug, 7th Sept and 19th Dec at Pensthorpe (SCh, SCo, PR), 100 on 11th Oct at N Tuddenham (BP) & 140 on 2nd Nov at Sparham Pools, (SCh).

Proof of breeding at Great Witchingham Common, West Raynham, Bittering and Pensthorpe.

Pink-footed Goose Anser brachyrhynchus

Uncommon winter visitor to WVBS area, most birds are recorded flying over. Amber listed.

28 sightings in total this year.

In the first winter period high counts of 50 on 4th Jan at Pensthorpe, (BP,ID), 80 on 6th Jan & 600 on 25th at Brandiston (SB), 120 on 7th Jan at Dereham, (IB, PR, CS) & 97 on 8th Jan at Haveringland Hall flying NE (JH).

In the 2nd winter period 300 on 25th Nov at Dereham, flying E (RG), 200 on 1st Dec at Worthing (DK), 300 on 1st Dec at Brandiston (SB), 210 on 20th Dec at Costessey (AB) and 200 on 20th Dec at Potters Fen & Hockering flying E (PA,PR).

Mute Swan Cygnus olor

Fairly common breeding resident. Amber listed.

Records from 18 sites throughout the valley.

Highest counts of 25 on 5th Jan at Guist Common (SCh,RN), at Pensthorpe 10 on 21st Jan (CH, MS), 16 on 14th Jun, (BH,RG), 10 on 6th Aug, (RG,LB), 14 on 9th Oct, (PR,RG) and 13 on 16th Oct (PA,MS).

Proof of breeding at Pensthorpe, Haveringland Hall, Sparham Pools, Sparham Hall Farm and Fustyweed (Elsing).

Bewick's Swan Cygnus colombianus

Uncommon winter visitor. Mainly flyovers. Amber listed.

3 records this year.

In the 1st winter period 8 on 7th Mar at Costessey (AB).

In the 2nd winter period 60 to 70 on 10th Nov at Queen's Hill (AB) and 26 on 30th Dec at Honingham (IB).

Whooper Swan Cygnus Cygnus

Uncommon winter visitor. Mainly flyovers. Amber listed.

4 records this year from 2 sites in the 2nd winter period.

Single birds on 2nd Nov (SCh), 16th Dec (IB) and 30th Dec (A&CJ) in Sparham Pools area. 3 birds recorded on 16th Dec at Bittering GP (IB).

Egyptian Goose Alopochen aegyptiaca

Naturalised resident, locally common.

Records of 1 to 10 birds from 17 sites. Highest counts at Pensthorpe of 66 on 20th Aug (PA,CH) & 7th Sept, (SCh,SCr), 65 on 9th Oct, (PR,RG).

Proof of breeding at Pensthorpe, Great Witchingham Common and Springfield Cottage, N Tuddenham.

Shelduck Tadorna tadorna

A scarce visitor to the valley. Amber listed.

Records from 6 sites from Jan to Aug. At Pensthorpe highest counts of 10 on 9th Apr (MS,PA), 10 on 26th June (LB,RN), at Bittering 12 on 14th Apr (SCh) and at Old Beetley 10 on 22nd June (BP).

Proof of breeding at Pensthorpe and Old Beetley.

Mandarin Duck Aix galericulata

Very scarce naturalised resident.

Recorded at 3 sites this year.

At Pensthorpe 2 on 27th Jan (CH,MS), 2 on 24th Apr (BP,ID) and 7 on 19th Dec (SCh,PR).

At Sparham Pools 2 on 25th Mar (SC) and at Guist Common 1 on 22nd Apr (IB,PR).

Garganey Spatula querquedula

Very scarce summer visitor and passage migrant. Amber listed.

6 records only from the Bintree Mill/Guist Common area.

Four on 6th/7th Mar at Guist Common (RG, PR) & maximum of 2 on 26th Mar at Bintree Mill (PA).

Shoveler Spatula clypeata

A winter visitor and rare breeder. Amber listed.

Records in all months from a total of 9 sites.

Highest counts at Pensthorpe of 21 on 4th Jan (BP,ID), 24 on 27th Jan (CH,MS), 30 on 6th Feb (LB,RG), 18 on 26th Mar (LB,RN) & 23 on 19th Dec (SCh,PR).

At Haveringland Hall 22 on 14th Oct & 42 on 9th Dec (JH).

Proof of breeding at Old Beetley & Pensthorpe.

Gadwall Mareca strepera

Resident, passage migrant and winter visitor. Amber listed.

Records in all months from a total of 13 sites.

Highest counts at Bittering GP of c100 on 7th Jan (IBI), at Haveringland Hall 144 on 8th Jan & 95 on 9th Dec (JH), at Pensthorpe 50 on 14th June (BH,RG), & 87 on 23rd Nov (SCo,CH), & at Sparham Pools 58 on 4th Nov (SCh) and 60 on 24th Nov (RG).

Wigeon Mareca penelope

A fairly common passage migrant and winter visitor. Amber listed. Records from 12 sites.

Highest counts in the 1st winter period at Bintree Mill of 45 on 1st Jan (IB), 140 on 15th Feb (BP) & c60 on 18th Mar (JH); at Creaking Gate Lake 40 on 7th Jan, (IBI); at Pensthorpe 77 on 6th Feb (LB,RG) & at Bittering GP 116 on 9th Mar (PJ).

In the 2nd winter period, highest counts at Pensthorpe of 33 on 13th Nov (BP, ID), 48 on 23rd Nov (SCo, CH) & 57 on 13th Dec (LB,RN).

Mallard Anas platyrhynchos

Common resident, passage migrant and winter visitor. Amber listed. Records in all months from a total of 21 sites.

Highest counts at Pensthorpe of 137 on 4th Jan (BP,ID), 90 on 14th June (BH,RG), 160 on 20th Aug (PA,CH), 194 on 25th Sept (RG,RN) and 175 on 23rd Nov (SCo,CH).

At Haveringland Hall 101 on 13th Jan & 97 on 21st Jan (JH).

At Bittering GP 421 on 9th Mar (PJ).

Pintail Anas acuta

Scarce winter visitor and passage migrant. Amber listed.

Records from 2 sites only.

At Ringland 2 birds recorded on 8th Jan (AB).

At Pensthorpe 1 to 2 birds recorded between 7th Sept & 23rd Nov (RG,RN, *et al*).

Teal Anas crecca

Fairly scarce winter visitor and rare breeder. Amber listed.

Records from 12 sites.

In the 1st winter period highest counts of 50+ on 1st Jan at Bintree Mill (IB), 68 on 4th Jan (BP,ID) and 155 on 27th Jan (CH, MS) at Pensthorpe, 60 on 7th Jan at Lexham (IBI) & 80 on 9th Mar at Bittering GP (PJ).

In the 2nd winter period highest counts at Pensthorpe of 350 on 9th Oct (PR,RG), 384 on 13th Nov (BP,ID), 690 on 23rd Nov (SCo,CH), 650 on 13th Dec (LB,RN) & 470 on 19th Dec (SC,PR); at Haveringland Hall 53 on 24th Sep (JH).

Pochard Aythya farina

Fairly common passage migrant & winter visitor, rare breeder. **Red listed.** Equal number of reports in the 1st and the 2nd winter periods.

Highest counts of 6 to 7 birds in Mar at Pensthorpe (LB,RG,PA, CH,RN).

Eight birds reported on 16th Oct at Pensthorpe (PA,MS).

Tufted Duck Aythya fuligula

Scarce breeder, fairly common passage migrant & winter visitor. Green listed.

Records of small flocks in every month of 4 to 15 birds at a total of 15 sites.

At Pensthorpe highest counts of 91 in Jan, 68 in Feb, 48 in Mar, 81 in Apr, 30 in June, 35 in July, 42 in Aug, 46 in Sept and 93 in Dec. Reports also of good numbers at Haveringland Hall of 56 in Jan, 27 in Feb, 33 in Mar and 35 in Dec.

Proof of breeding at Pensthorpe and Great Witchingham Common.

Goldeneye Bucephala clangula

Very scarce winter visitor & passage migrant. Amber listed.

Records from 2 sites only.

In the 1st winter period 2 on 1st Jan at Blickling Lake, (SB) and 2 to 6 birds recorded at Pensthorpe, Jan to Mar, (RG *et al*).

In the 2nd winter period records only from Pensthorpe of 1 to 3 birds from Sept to Dec.

Goosander Mergus merganser

Scarce winter visitor & passage migrant. Green listed.

In the first winter period 1 bird on 22nd Feb at Pensthorpe (PA,CH), 2 on 16th Mar at Worthing (DK) and 1 on 9th Apr at Sparham Pools (SCh).

In the 2nd winter period only sighting was of 1 bird on 2nd Nov at Old Costessey (SCh).

Red-legged Partridge Alectoris rufa

Common naturalised resident. Thousands are released annually.

Records from 18 sites of from 1 to 10 birds.

Highest counts of 10 on 7th Jan at Gt Ryburgh (SCh, RN), 6 on 29th Aug at Worthing & 6 on 8th Sept at Worthing level crossing area (DK), 11 on 16th Sept & 10 on 21st Oct on HBW (DK).

Grey Partridge Perdix perdix

Scarce resident, declined in recent years. Red listed.

Records in most months of 1 to 5 birds from a total of 10 sites.

Highest counts of 6 birds on 7th Jan at Gately (C&FN, A&CJ), 11 on 15th July & 11 on 20th Sept at Scarning (IB), 15 on 19th July & 1st Aug at N Tuddenham (BP) & 7 on 1st Nov at Brandiston (SB).

Proof of breeding at N Tuddenham.

Pheasant Phasianus colchicus

Very common naturalised resident. Thousands are released annually. Records of 1 to 5 birds in most months from a total of 20 sites.

Highest counts on HBW of 7 on 15th Apr, 8 on 21st Oct & 15 on 18th Nov (DK); at Pensthorpe 7 on 4th Jan, 7 on 19th Feb & 8 on 9th Apr (BP,ID, et al) & at SMHOT 7 on 1st Feb (DG).

Proof of breeding at Pensthorpe and N Tuddenham.

Little Grebe Trachybaptus ruficollis

Very scarce resident and winter visitor. Breeds in small numbers. Green listed.

Records from 8 sites. The HBW recorded numbers between 1 and 3 in most months.

Highest counts of 3 on 7th Jan at Lexham (BP,ID,AN), 5 on 10th May at Gt Ryburgh (PA), 4 on 14th Aug at Bittering (SC), 7 on 9th Sept at Haveringland Hall (JH) and 6 on 27th Sept & 30th Nov at Sparham Pools (SCh).

Proof of breeding at Gt Ryburgh, Bittering and Sparham Pools.

Great Crested Grebe Podiceps cristatus

Scarce resident often departing to the coast in winter months. Green listed.

Records from 13 sites of 1 to 4 birds.

Highest counts of 5 on 7th Jan at Swanton Morley GP (PA,BM,SO'D), 6 on 24th Apr at Lyng Easthaugh (SCh), 6 on 24th June, 8 on 10th Sept & 6 on 11th Oct at Sparham Pools (SC),

2 pairs on 17^{th} Apr at Sparham Hall Farm (RG) and 4 birds on 5^{th} June at Bittering (BP).

Proof of breeding at Gt Witchingham Common and Sparham Pools.

White Stork Ciconia ciconia

Scarce vagrant.

Single bird on 25th Mar at Bintree Mill (PR).

Bittern Botaurus stellaris

Very scarce winter visitor. Amber listed.

Two records this year of single birds the first on 5th Mar at Lyng Easthaugh & the second on 18th Oct in the Sparham Pools area (SCh).

Cattle Egret Bubulcus ibis

Rare visitor.

Unconfirmed report of a single bird in the Reepham area on $7^{\rm th}$ Aug (DB).

Grey Heron Ardea cinerea

Fairly common resident. Green listed.

Records from 24 sites mainly of 1 to 2 birds. Highest counts of 11 on 22nd Mar at Bintree Mill (IB), c26 on 17th Apr at Gt Witchingham, (A&CJ), 4 on 20th May, 4 in June & July and 3 in Dec on the HBW (DK), 4 on 10th June at Guist (IB), 4 on 10th Sept at Sparham Pools and 6 on 25th at Pensthorpe (RG,RN).

Proof of breeding at Hall Farm, Gt Witchingham with 12 active and 2 possibly active nests.



Great White Egret

Ardea alba

Rare but increasing visitor. Single birds in Mar at Sparham Pools on 8th (CS) & at Lyng Easthaugh on 12th (JH).

Two on 14th Sep at Pensthorpe (IB). Single birds in Oct at Ringland on 3rd/4th (SCh) & 7th (BP), in Dec at Elsing Bridge on 8th (BP) and at Honingham on 30th (IB).

Little Egret Egretta garzetta

Very scarce resident. Green listed.

Records from 24 sites. Highest counts of 8 birds on 6th Jan at Worthing (DK), 5 on 12th Feb at Dereham, Rush Meadows (PA), 4 on 22nd Feb, 5 on 25th Apr & 6 on 13th Nov at Pensthorpe (PA,CH,BP,ID).

Cormorant Phalacrocorax carbo

Fairly common winter visitor increasing in numbers, some non-breeding birds present in summer. **Green listed**.



Records of 1 to 5 birds from a total of 15 sites.

Highest counts of 11 on 21st Jan on HBW (DK), 8 on 22nd Feb, 9 on 25th Sept, 9 on 9th Oct, 10 on 13th Nov & 11 on 13th Dec at Pensthorpe (PA,CH, *et al*), also 16 on 13th Dec at Sparham Pools (SCh).

Cormorant, by Gil Brooking

Osprey Pandion haliaetus

Very scarce passage migrant, increasing in frequency in recent years. Amber listed.

2 sightings this year of single birds on 29th Sept in the Sparham Pools area and on 3rd Oct at Elsing (SCh).

Honey Buzzard Pernis apivorus

Very scarce summer visitor and passage migrant. **Amber listed**. 3 sightings this year.

1 bird on 28th June at Potters Fen (PA), 2 birds on 1st July at Swanton Novers (IB) and a single bird on 6th Aug at Pensthorpe (RG,LB).

Sparrowhawk Accipiter nisus

Fairly common resident, passage migrant and winter visitor. Green listed.

Seventy records of mainly single birds from 27 sites.

The HBW recorded 2 birds in Sept, 3 in Nov & 2 in Dec.

Numbers of 2 to 3 birds were recorded at Swanton Novers, Sparham Pools, Pensthorpe, Scarning & Dereham Rush Meadows.

Again this year several members recorded hunting around their garden feeders.



Goshawk Accipiter gentilis Rare passage migrant and winter visitor to valley. **Green listed**.

Seven records from Swanton Novers RWP this year.

2 birds on 25^{th} Feb, 5 on 9^{th} Mar, 3 on 20^{th} Mar, 1 on 25^{th} Mar, 1 on 7^{th} Apr, 1 on 26^{th} Apr & 2 on 2^{nd} July (SCh,IB,A&CJ,PR).

Goshawk, by Gil Brooking

Marsh Harrier Circus aeruginosus

Very scarce passage migrant and increasing summer visitor to valley breeding in small numbers. **Amber listed**.

Twenty records of largely single birds from 8 sites, 14 of these from Pensthorpe & Guist Common.

Higher counts of 3 birds at Guist Common on 6th Apr (RG) and 4 at Pensthorpe on 7th Sept (SCo,SCh).

A pair recorded in June at SMHOT but no reports of juveniles.

Hen Harrier Circus cyaneus

Uncommon winter visitor. Red listed.

1 record of a juvenile on 3rd Sept at Gt Ryburgh (SCh).

Red Kite Milvus milvus

Very scarce resident established from reintroductions elsewhere in England. Green listed.

Records of mainly single birds through the year from a total of 25 sites. Fifty-three records in total of which 19 were from the Honingham area.

Highest counts at Colton of 9 birds on 12th Nov (SCh) and at Honingham area going into roost 19 birds on 14th & 27th Nov & 15 on 28th Nov (SCh), 10 on 18th Dec (PR) & 30th Dec (IB).

Rough-legged Buzzard Buteo lagopus

Scarce winter visitor.

Single bird flying NW mobbed by corvids in the Sparham Pools area on 2nd Nov (SCh).

Buzzard Buteo buteo

Scarce resident and passage migrant. Green listed.

Occasional sightings of largely 1-4 birds at 66 sites.

Higher counts of 5 on HBW in Jan; 9 at Pensthorpe in Feb; max 10 at Swanton Novers in Mar; 5 on HBW, 7 at Pensthorpe & 6+ at Swanton Novers in Apr; 10 on the HBW in May; 6+ at Swanton Novers in July; 9 at Pensthorpe & 5 during HBW in Aug; 8 at Costessey & Scarning in Sept; 5 in Sparham Pools area in Oct; 6 during HBW in Nov & Dec.

Evidence of breeding at Wellingham where chicks were observed in a nest and 2 pairs in Sparham Hall Farm area. Other pairs reported "visible, presumably breeding" at Bylaugh Park, Elsing, Lyng Easthaugh, Weston Park and Whitwell. The species also reported as "permanently resident" at Costessey.

Water Rail Rallus aquaticus

Very scarce resident and winter visitor. Green listed.

During first winter period 4 at Costessey Fish Farm & 1-2 at Fakenham Common, Norwich (Swanton Rd), Pensthorpe, Scarning, H&OT Sculthorpe Moor Reserve & Swanton Morley GP.

During second winter period 1-2 at Great Witchingham Common & Pensthorpe. In Sparham Pools area 6 winter feeding territories identified over 3 visits to the site (SCh).

Corncrake Crex crex

Rare summer visitor. Red listed.

Single bird heard during HBW on 17th June and was probably a bird from the Pensthorpe Conservation Trust's Reintroduction Project.

Moorhen Gallinula cloropus.

Common resident supplemented by autumn immigrants. Green listed. Occasional reports of 1-10 birds from 15 sites.

Higher counts at Pensthorpe of 33 Jan, 25 Feb, 28 Mar, 11 Apr, 31 July, 68 Aug, 38 Sept, 30 Oct, 44 Nov, 45 Dec; in Sparham Pools area of 16 Sept & 12 Oct.

Evidence of breeding at Great Witchingham Common, Pensthorpe & Worthing Bridge.

Coot Falica atra.

Common resident and winter visitor. Green listed.

Occasional reports of 1-8 birds at 6 sites.

Higher counts in Jan of 45 at Bittering & Haveringland Hall lake & 42 at Pensthorpe; in Feb 58 at Pensthorpe with 24 in Mar, 16 in Apr, 19 in June, 48 in July & 73 in Aug; in Sept 24 at Haveringham Hall Lake, 89 at Pensthorpe 33 in Sparham Pools area; in Oct 125 at Pensthorpe & 15 in Sparham Pools area; in Nov 135 at Pensthorpe & 39 in Sparham Pools; in Dec 33 at Haveringham Hall & max 142 at Pensthorpe.

Breeding at Pensthorpe but no evidence of breeding reported from other sites.

Crane Grus grus.

A rare visitor from the small resident population in the Broads, free flying from Pensthorpe's breeding programme or less likely a continental vagrant. Amber listed.

Three birds at Swanton Novers on 9th Mar (SCh) & 15 flying over Pensthorpe on 28th Aug presumed to be wild birds (AA).

Oystercatcher Haematopus ostralegus

Scarce summer visitor. Amber listed.

Earliest reports of 8 at Pensthorpe on 22nd Feb & 2 at Sparham on 26th.

Subsequently occasional reports of 1-4 birds from 16 sites with higher counts of 28 at Pensthorpe in Mar & 13 in Apr; 10 at Bittering & 9 at Pensthorpe in Apr, 8 in May, 11 in June & 9 in July.

Breeding at Pensthorpe where adults with young observed but numbers not recorded. Probable breeding at Sparham Hall Farm fishing lakes where pair seen in Mar and 2 birds with nest in June. No subsequent reports of fledged young received.

Last report of birds in the valley was of 3 at Pensthorpe on 20th Aug.

Avocet Recurvirostra avosetta

Rare summer visitor. Amber listed.

First reported spring arrival was of 8 at Pensthorpe on 26^{th} Mar. Followed in Apr by 2 at Bittering on 10^{th} , 2 at Great Ryburgh on 22^{nd} & 8 still present at Pensthorpe on 25^{th} . This increased to 12 on 5^{th} May & 15 on 26^{th} June – 13^{th} July.

Two also present at Old Beetley on 22nd June.

Bred at Pensthorpe where 14+ chicks counted there on 14th June.

Last report of single at Pensthorpe on 6th Aug.

Lapwing Vanellus vanellus.

Scarce summer visitor, common winter visitor and passage migrant. **Red listed**.

During first winter period counts in Jan of 50 at Bittering, 110 at Great Ryburgh, 50 at Gressenhall, 150 at Kettlestone, 30+ at Swanton Morley GP, 25 at Bylaugh; in Feb 400 at Gateley, 600 at Hoe, 324 on HBW, 140 at N Tuddenham, 450 at Pensthorpe, 100 at Scarning & 50 at Worthing; in Mar 25 at Bittering GP, max 42 at Pensthorpe & 27 at Swanton Novers.

During post-breeding & second winter periods max 320 at Pensthorpe & 105 at Sparham in Aug; in Sept 200 at Bittering, 30 at Guist & 112 at Pensthorpe; in Nov max 32 at Pensthorpe; in Dec 50 at Hoe, 33 on HBW & 345 at Pensthorpe.

Proof of breeding at Pensthorpe but number of fledglings not known.

Golden Plover Pluvialis apricaria

Fairly common passage migrant and winter visitor. Green listed.

Counts during first winter period; Jan 10 at Great Ryburgh, 40 between Hockering/Lenwade, 2 at Kettlestone 15 at Gateley all on 7th; Feb 300 at Hoe on 14th, 204 at Scarning on 18th; Mar 7 at Hoe on 5th; last spring report 23 at Swannington on 6th Apr.

Earliest report of passage birds was 50 at Brandiston on 10th Aug then 4 at Reepham on 30th. In Sept 80 at Great Ryburgh on 21st; in Oct 1 at N Tuddenham on 7th, 80 at Cawston Heath on 8th, 3+ heard calling in murky conditions at Costessey on 17th, 30 at Brandiston on 28th; in Nov 20 at Brandiston on 2nd, 86 at Colton on 17th, 27 at Pensthorpe on 23rd; in Dec c150 between Lenwade/Weston Longville & c200 at Weston Longville on 24th.

Little Ringed Plover Charadris dubius

Passage migrant and very scarce summer visitor. Green listed.

Earliest report single bird at Ringland on 21st Mar (PR) then 3 at Beetley on 31st (IB). During Apr up to 2 at Beetley & 4+ at Bittering on 14th, in May only reported at Pensthorpe with a count of 12 on 30th (JH); in June max 4 at Old Beetley on 22nd & single bird at Pensthorpe on 26th.

Juvenile at Pensthorpe on 13th July indicates probable breeding there (BP).

Whimbrel Numenius phaeopus

Rare passage migrant. Red listed.

Single bird flying south at Costessey at 7am on 19th Apr (AG) and another single bird at Ringland on the same day (MMc).

Curlew Numenius arquata

Rare passage migrant. Red listed.

Single bird at Cawston Heath on 30th Mar (JH); on 15th Apr 3 on HBW (DK) and a further single bird at Cawston Heath (JH).



Black-tailed Godwit Limosa

limosa

Very rare passage migrant. **Red** *listed*.

In Apr single bird at Guist Common on 7th (PR) and at Sparham Pools on 15th (SCh).

In Aug 2 at Pensthorpe on the 5^{th} & 6^{th} (LB,RG,JH)

Ruff Calidris pugnax

Scarce passage migrant and winter visitor in valley. **Red listed**.

A juvenile at Pensthorpe on 8th Aug (SCh).

Dunlin Calidris alpina

Very rare passage migrant. Amber listed.

Small numbers of spring and autumn passage birds reported. On Mar 1st 2 at Dereham SW, on 1st with a single bird on 2nd (IB); on 16th single bird at Ringland (PR).

In Aug 3 at Pensthorpe on 5th and 2 on 6th (LB,RG,JH).

Woodcock Scolopax rusticola

Scarce resident, fairly common passage migrant and winter visitor. **Red listed**.

Occasional records from seven sites during first winter period. In Jan single birds at Hoe Common & Swanton Morley; in Feb 2 at Brandiston; in Mar 1 at Worthing, 3 at Costessey Fish Farm, 3 at Lyng Easthaugh & 1 at Brandiston. High count of 8 at Dereham SW on 2nd Mar (IB).

During breeding period single bird at Wellingham in Apr & May and a single bird at Marsham Heath on 29th May. No reports of roding birds received. Just one report during second winter period of a single bird at Great Witchingham Common on 27th Oct.

Jack Snipe Lymnocryptes minimus

Very scarce passage migrant and winter visitor. Green listed.

Single birds in Jan at Buxton Heath on 13^{th} (JH) and Scarning on the 30^{th} (DN).

Snipe Gallinago gallinago.

Very scarce resident and scarce winter visitor and passage migrant. Amber listed.

Occasional records from 15 sites with no reports of breeding birds.

First winter counts in Jan of 14 at Old Beetley on 7th, 7 at Haveringland Hall on 8th, 13 at Buxton Heath on 13th, 9 at Pensthorpe on 27th, 20 at Scarning on 30th; in Mar 7 at Costessey Fish Farm on 3rd, 35 at Sparham Pools on 7th, 12 at Bittering on 18th, 5 at Great Ryburgh on 25th.

During autumn/second winter period in Sept 8 at Pensthorpe on 7th; in Oct 6 at Guist Common on 8th, 5 at Sparham Pools on 18th; in Nov 8 at Costessey Marsh on 4th.

Common Sandpiper Actitis hypoleucos

Rare passage migrant. Amber listed.

Passage birds recorded at five sites.

In Apr 2 at Pensthorpe on 25th, in May 3 at Haveringland Hall on 20th, in June single bird at Bittering GP on 26th. In Aug 2 at Pensthorpe on 5th & 8th and 2 at Bittering on 14th.

In Sept single birds at Great Witchingham Common on 4^{th} and Pensthorpe on $7^{\text{th}}.$

Green Sandpiper Tringa ochropus

Very scarce passage migrant and winter visitor. Amber listed.

Occasional reports of wintering birds at 6 sites during first winter period. In Jan single bird at Scarning on 14th; in Feb 2 at Scarning on 6th and single birds at Dereham Water Meadows on 12th & Dereham Neatherd Moor on 15th; in Mar single bird at Dereham SW on 1st & 3rd, single bird at Great Ryburgh & 1-2 at Rawhall Pit, Beetley on 25th, singles at Dereham Neatherd Moor on 27th and Felthorpe on 31st.

Probable spring passage birds in Apr when single at Dereham Neatherd Moor on 12^{th} then at Bittering 6 on 14^{th} , single birds on 23^{rd} & 26^{th} .

Interesting reports of 2 at Bittering GP on 26th June & 4 at Pensthorpe on 13th July. Non-breeders or early passage birds?

Probable passage birds at Pensthorpe in Aug when 4 birds between 5th & 8th, 3 on 14th & 2 on 20th. Also single bird at N Tuddenham on 22nd and 3 at Haveringland Hall on 31st. In Sept still 4 at Pensthorpe on 7th & a single bird there on 25th. In Oct 3 at Pensthorpe on 9th with no further wintering records to end of year.

Redshank Tringa totanus

Scarce passage migrant and winter visitor. Amber listed.

In Mar single birds at Dereham SW on 2nd & 3rd (IB); one flying over R Tud at Costessey on 24th, a rare bird for this area (AG); one at Beetley on 25th (IB,PR).

In Apr single bird at Bittering on 13^{th} (IB,PR); in May 3 at Pensthorpe on 30^{th} (JH); in July 2+ at Brandiston on 7^{th} (SB).

Wood Sandpiper Tringa glareola

Very rare passage migrant. Amber listed.

A single bird at Bittering on 3rd May (BP).

Greenshank Tringa nebularia

Very rare passage migrant. Amber listed.

Single bird at Pensthorpe on 5th May (JH); in Aug 3 briefly late afternoon at Pensthorpe and a single bird at Bittering both on 14th (SCh).

Black-headed Gull Chroicocephalus ridibundus

Common passage migrant and winter visitor. Scarce breeder. Amber listed.

First winter period counts in Jan 110 at Great Ryburgh; in Feb 51 at Dereham Neatherd Moor & max 140 at Pensthorpe; in Mar c200 at Cawston Heath 54 at Haveringland Hall, 100 during HBW & max 432 at Pensthorpe.

During Apr 300+ at Guist, 350 during HBW & max 262 at Pensthorpe.

Proof of breeding at Sparham Pools and Pensthorpe where up to 30 juveniles out of 206 birds in mid-Aug.

Post breeding/second winter period counts in Sept max 120 at Sparham Pools & 127 at Pensthorpe; in Oct 110 at Pensthorpe & max 77 at Sparham Pools; in Nov max 519 at Pensthorpe; in Dec max 141 at Pensthorpe & 50+ at Great Ryburgh.

Mediterranean Gull Ichthyaetus melanocephalus

Rare winter visitor. Amber listed.

On Mar 24th single bird at Great Ryburgh (PR), on 26th 2 at Cawston Heath (JH) & Pensthorpe (LB,RN) plus a single bird at Scarning (IB).

In Apr 2 at Sparham Pools on 18th (SCh) and a single bird at Lyng Easthaugh on 24th (SCh).

Common Gull Larus canus

Common winter and scarce summer non-breeding visitor. Amber listed. During first winter period counts in Jan of 20 at Great Ryburgh; in Feb 27 at Dereham Neatherd Moor; in Mar 16 at Haveringland Hall & 37 at Dereham Neatherd Moor where in the first week of Apr 110 were counted.

Between the second week of Apr and the end of Oct occasional counts of 1-4 birds at 7 scattered sites.

In second winter period no high numbers recorded except 61 at Pensthorpe in Nov & 15 during the HBW in Dec.

Great Black-backed Gull Larus marinus

Scarce non-breeding visitor present throughout the year. Amber listed.

Reports from only 3 sites. In Jan 1 at Broomsthorpe on 7^{th} & 1 at Pensthorpe on 20^{th} .

In Sept 2 at Sparham Pools area on 10^{th} ; in Oct 1 at Pensthorpe on 9^{th} ; in Nov max 2 at Pensthorpe on 23^{rd} then a single bird there during Dec.

Glaucous Gull Larus hyperboreus

Very scarce winter vistor in valley. Amber listed.

A juvenile bird at Earlham Marshes on 21st Mar (PR).

Herring Gull Larus argentatus

Fairly common passage migrant and winter visitor with some birds remaining throughout the year. **Red listed**.

During first winter period only two sizeable counts of 12 at Bylaugh SW on 7th Jan & 17 at Pensthorpe on 22nd Feb. Elsewhere occasional reports of 1-6 birds at a further 6 sites.

During Apr to end of August occasional reports of 1-8 birds at 6 sites. High count of 100 birds flying to roost NW over Sparham Pools area on 10th Sept. In the second winter period again only two high counts of 13 at Pensthorpe & 20 in Sparham Pools area during Nov. Elsewhere occasional reports of 1-5 birds at 5 sites.

Lesser Black-backed Gull Larus fuscus

Fairly common winter and scarce non-breeding summer visitor. Amber listed. (graellsii).

Occasional reports of 1-4 birds from 14 sites.

Higher counts of 8 at Dereham Neatherd Moor in May, 8 at Dereham Potters Fen in July & 5 at Costessey in Aug.

Common Tern Sterna hirundo

Scarce summer visitor and passage migrant. Amber listed.

Earliest reports were of single birds at Sparham Pools & at Three Bridges Farm, Elsing on 7th Apr (IB,SCh,PR).

Occasional reports of 1-2 birds at 9 sites scattered through the valley. Two birds in the R Tud valley reported as the first for the valley on 20th Apr (AG).

Breeding at Sparham Pools & Pensthorpe. Twenty birds counted at Sparham Pools on 6th June.

Latest report was of 10 birds at Pensthorpe on 6th Aug (LB,RG).

Arctic Tern Sterna paradisaea

Rare passage migrant. Amber listed.

Single bird at Sparham Pools on 7^{th} (SCh) followed by 10 there on 30^{th} (DN).

Rock Dove (Feral Pigeon) Columba livia

Common resident. Green listed.

Reported present at 3 sites – Dereham Water Meadows 12 on 31st May & 10 on 25th July; Potter's Fen, Dereham single on 9th Aug; Pensthorpe 4 on 7th Sept.

Stock Dove Columba oenas

Fairly common resident. Amber listed.

Occasional reports of small groups of 1-6 birds from 28 sites. Higher counts of 10 at Guist Common, 10 at Swanton Morley GP & 18 at Raynham on 7th Jan; 9 at Pensthorpe on 20th Aug; 12 at Queen's Hills, Costessey; 11 at Costessey on 8th Oct; 8 in Sparham Pools area on 2nd Nov; a peak count of 12 migrating through the R Tud valley, Costessey on 18th Nov; 18 at Pensthorpe on 23rd Nov.

One report of breeding at Elsing where pair had 2 eggs (RG,RN). Some reports of the species coming to feed below garden feeders.

Woodpigeon Columba palumbus

Very common resident. Green listed.

Highest counts - Jan c100 during HBW; Feb 200 HBW & c165 at Dereham Neatherd Moor; Mar 250 at Brandiston; HBW 100 in Mar; 200 in Apr, 100 in May, 150 in Sept, c100 in Oct & 150 in Nov. Also in Nov a peak counts of 794 migrating through the R Tud valley, Costessey on 3rd with a further 642 on 4th.

Turtle Dove Streptopelia turtur

Scarce summer visitor and passage migrant. Red listed.

Earliest report was of a single bird at Lyng Easthaugh on 24th Apr (SCh) with a pair there on 29th (RG). Single birds present at Sparham Pools on 2nd May (IB), N Tuddenham on 6th & 7th June (BP) and Guist on 10th June (IB). Initially single bird at Alderford Common on 11th June (JH) then 2 present on 26th (AB) & 28th (LB) and 9th July (MW, *et al*). Single male at Alderford on 10th July (RG,RN) was latest report.

No proof of breeding received.

Collared Dove Streptopelia decaocto

Fairly common resident associated with human habitation. Green listed.

Occasional records of 1-7 birds at 20 sites. Highest counts - 12 at Great Ryburgh on 7th Jan, 16 at Sculthorpe Moor NR on 1st Feb & 11 at Dereham Neatherd Moor on 3rd May.

Proof of breeding only reported from Dereham Neatherd Moor.

Cuckoo Cuculus canorus

Scarce summer visitor and passage migrant. Red listed.

Earliest report was of 2 birds at Sparham Pools on 15th Apr (IB). Subsequently occasional reports of single birds at 16 further sites with latest being at Pensthorpe on 13th July (BP).

Proof of breeding at Swanton Morley where a nestling was found in a Dunnock's nest on 7th July (RG,BM).

Barn Owl Tyto alba

Fairly common resident. Green listed.



Occasional reports of largely single birds from 28 sites. Two birds at Scarning in Jan, 2 at Mattishall in Feb, 2 at Brandiston & 3 at Elsing Mill Street in Mar, 2 at Mileham in Aug.

Breeding at Worthing, where adults seen feeding young in local barn. Two pairs bred at Swanton Morley where one deserted nest contained 4 cold eggs and the other nest contained 3 blind and naked young.

Barn Owl, by Gil Brooking

Tawny Owl Strix aluco

Fairly common resident. Amber listed.

Recorded in all months and from 17 localities. Mainly singles but 3 at Brandiston in Dec (SB), 2 Great Witchingham Common in Oct (RG), 3 males and a female Hockering Woods in Sept (SCh), 2 Scarning in Jan (IB) and 2 Sparham Holes in Nov (SCh). No proof of breeding was recorded.

Little Owl Athene noctua

Fairly common naturalised resident.

Recorded in all months and from 15 localities. Proof of breeding came from Elsing, Swanton Morley and Worthing while 2 pairs were recorded from Brandiston (SB).

Nightjar Caprimulgus europeaus

Scarce summer visitor. Amber listed.

Up to 5 males were reported from Marsham Heath in late May (BP, JH).

Swift Apus apus

Common summer visitor and passage migrant. Amber listed.

First report was a single at Pensthorpe on 24th Apr (BH) followed by 5 at the same site on 2nd May.

Counts of 20 or more came from HBW, Old Beetley, Pensthorpe and Worthing while 50+ were recorded from Reepham in July (DG).

Last sighting of the year was 2 at Costessey on 29th Aug (SCh).

Kingfisher Alcedo atthis

Scarce resident. Amber listed.

Recorded throughout the year from 14 sites in singles other than 2 at Pensthorpe and Rushmeadows, Scarning.

Great Spotted Woodpecker Dendrocopos major

Common resident. Increasingly visiting garden feeders. Green listed.

Recorded throughout the year from 25 localities, mainly 1's and 2's but 5 to 6 were regularly reported on HBW and 5 were at Pensthorpe in Jan & Feb. Surprisingly no proof of breeding was recorded.

Green Woodpecker Picis viridis

Fairly common resident. Green listed.

Recorded throughout the year from 21 localities, mainly 1's and 2's but 4 were recorded on HBW on several occasions.

Kestrel Falco tinnunculus

Fairly common resident and passage migrant. Amber listed.

Recorded throughout the year from 46 localities. Proof of breeding came from Bylaugh, Great Ryburgh, Pensthorpe, Swanton Morley (2 pairs) and Taverham Mill.

Hobby Falco subbuteo.

Very scarce summer visitor and passage migrant. Green listed.

First reported on 23rd Apr on Cawston Heath (JH) then a further 17 localities. Last recorded on 17th Sept at Honingham (SCh).

Peregrine Falco peregrinus

Very scarce passage migrant and winter visitor. Green listed.

In addition to breeding on Norwich cathedral birds were recorded from Aylsham church tower on 12th Nov and 3rd Dec with ring ZH (PR), Bintree Mill 22nd Mar (PR), Bittering 13th Apr (IB, PR), Brandiston 8th Feb (SB), Costessey 6th Mar (AB), Lenwade 24th May (RG), Pensthorpe 19th Dec (SCh, PR), Swanton Novers 25th Feb (IB) & 9th Mar (SCh) and West Raynham 7th Jan (PA, BM, SO'D).

Ring-necked Parakeet Psittacula krameri

Rare naturalised resident or escape.

A single was recorded in Costessey on 5th July followed by 4 on 15th & 17th July (AG). The 4 may have been a family party raising the possibility of breeding nearby.

Jay Garrulus glandarius

Fairly common resident and winter visitor. Green listed.

Recorded from 33 localities in 1s and 2s but up to 6 Alderford Common 19th Apr (LB), 5 Rushmeadow Dereham 4th Oct (PA), 8 HBW 20th May & 16th Sept (DK), 5 Pensthorpe 25th Sept (RN, RG) and 5 Potters Fen several dates in Oct (PA).

Magpie Pica pica

Common resident. Green listed.

Recorded from 25 localities with a maximum count of 12 Queens Hills, Norwich 19th Sept (SCh). Only proof of breeding Potters Fen where feeding young on lawn (PA).

Jackdaw Coloeus monedula

Common resident. Green listed.

Maximum counts of 50 or more: 58 HBW on 18th Feb; 70 Sparham Pools on 30th Nov; 100+ Guist Common on 7th Jan and 200 Pensthorpe on 14th Aug. While recorded from 25 localities breeding was only confirmed from Elsing and Wellingham.

Rook Corvus frugilegus

Common resident. Green listed.

Maximum counts of 100 or more: 100 HBW on 21st Jan & 20th May; 100+ West Raynham on 7th Jan; 220 Pensthorpe on 9th Oct and there were 85 active nests at Hall Farm, Great Witchingham on 17th Apr (A&CJ).

Carrion Crow Corvus corone

Common resident. Green listed.

Single figure counts from 23 localities with 30 on HBW on 20th May and 37 in Costessey on 22nd Aug being the highest counts of the year.

Waxwing Bombycilla garrulus

Scarce irruptive late autumn and winter visitor to the valley. Green listed.



A single record of one at Bowthorpe, Norwich on 11th Nov (SCh).

Coal Tit Periparus ater Common resident. Green listed.

Recorded from 16 localities with the highest count of the year 11 at Pensthorpe on 13th Dec (LB, RN).

Marsh Tit Poecile palustris

Fairly common resident. Red listed.

Recorded from 14 localities with highest counts of only 5 at Pensthorpe and 6 on HBW. 2 pairs were feeding young at SMHOT on 1st June (RG).

Willow Tit Poecile montanus

Very scarce and declining resident. Red listed.

A single record on 25th Feb at SMHOT (IB). This is a species that requires verification by the County Record Committee.

Blue Tit Cyanistes caeruleus

Common resident. Green listed.

The highest counts of the year were 20 on both Cawston / Marsham Heath and N Tuddenham Common and 36 at Pensthorpe.

Great Tit Parus major

Common resident. Green listed.

Highest counts of the year were 20 on Cawston / Marsham Heath and 30 at Pensthorpe.

Woodlark Lallula arborea

Scarce summer visitor. Green listed.

One or two were reported from Cawston / Marsham Heath during Mar and Apr (JH, SCh).

Skylark Alauda arvensis

Common resident, passage migrant and winter visitor. Red listed.

Recorded from 17 localities with the highest count of the year 24 at Marsham Heath on 21st Oct. Elsewhere there were 12 at Marriott's Way Costessey on 5th Oct.

Sand Martin

Riparia riparia Common summer visitor and passage migrant. Decreasing. **Green listed**.



First birds of the year were 2 at Guist Common on 5th Apr (PR). Highest counts reported were 30 at Pensthorpe on 25th Apr and 20+ at Sparham Pools on 29th Apr, however, 120 were ringed at the Lyng Easthaugh colony in June (RG).

The last record of the year was 2 at Costessey on 22nd Aug (SCh).

Swallow Hirundo rustica

Common summer visitor and passage migrant. Decreasing. Green listed.

The first birds of the year were 3 at Swanton Morley GPs on 7^{th} Apr (PR).

Maximum counts were 50+ at Sparham Hall Farm on 29th Apr and 50 at Guist Common on 2nd Aug. Breeding success came from Great Witchingham Equestrian Centre c20 pairs, Lyng Easthaugh 3+pairs, Pensthorpe, Swanton Morley 8 pairs (BM), Themelthorpe 3 pairs, Weston Longville Equestrian Centre 2+pairs, Wellingham and Worthing. Note a strong association with livestock.

The last record was of 3 at Brandiston on 24th Sept (SB).

House Martin Delichon urbicum

Common summer visitor and passage migrant. Amber listed.

The first record of the year was 1 at Haveringland Hall on 8th Apr (JH). Highest count of the year was 100+ at Guist Common on 14th Aug (LB, RN, RG). There were also counts of 100 at Pensthorpe on 7th Sept, 50+ N Tuddenham on 26th June and 50 Costessey on 13th Aug.

Breeding was reported from N Tuddenham where 4+ boxes were occupied, Reepham, Potters Fen and Wellingham where visiting 12 nestboxes.

Last sighting of the year was one on 13th Oct at Costessey (SCh).

Cetti's Warbler Cettia cetti

Rare resident expanding its range through valley. Green listed.

Recorded from Bintree Mill 2, Costessey Fish Farm and Pits, Great Witchingham Common, Guist Common 2, Pensthorpe 3 and Sparham Pools.

Long-tailed Tit Aegithalos caudatus

Common resident. Green listed.

Recorded from 29 locations throughout the year. While no proof of breeding was recorded the following maxima counts by site indicate a successful year. The highest count was 30 at Sparham Pools on 10th Sept, elsewhere there were 25 at Cawston / Marsham Heath on 27th Aug, 20 at Pensthorpe on 7th Sept and the same at Worthing on 4th July.

Willow Warbler Phylloscopus trochilus

Common summer resident and passage migrant. Amber listed.

The first arrival was on 8th Apr at Haveringland Hall.

Recorded from 14 localities and the highest counts, both in late Apr, were 6 at Pensthorpe and 7 along the Marriott's Way.

The last bird of the year was at Sparham Pools on 18th Oct.

Chiffchaff Phylloscopus collybita

Common summer resident, passage migrant and very scarce winter visitor. Green listed.

Up to 3 birds were recorded at Bylaugh SW between 7^{th} Jan and 14^{th} Feb.

This was followed by singles at Dereham SW on 2nd Mar, Sparham Pools 6th Mar and Elsing 10th Mar. The main influx was from the end of the month.

Recorded from 28 localities with maximum counts of 16 Pensthorpe on 7th Sept and 14 Sparham Pools on 10th Sept.

The last record of the year was 2 at Bylaugh SW on 7th Oct.

Sedge Warbler Acrocephalus schoenobaenus

Fairly common summer resident and passage migrant. Green listed.

The first record of the year was from Lyng Easthaugh on 7^{th} Apr (SCh).

Recorded from only 4 localities: Guist Common, Lyng Easthaugh, Pensthorpe and Sparham Pools complex.

Maximum count was 4 at Pensthorpe on 26th June and the last record 14th Aug at Guist Common.

Reed Warbler Acrocephalus scirpaceous

Fairly common summer resident and passage migrant. Green listed.

The first records of the year were 2 at Lyng Easthaugh and 3 at Sparham Pools on 24th Apr (SCh).

Recorded from only 6 localities: Guist Common, Haveringland Hall, Lyng Easthaugh, Pensthorpe, Sparham Pools and Whitwell Common.

Maximum count was 15 at Pensthorpe on 11th May while only 11 were caught and ringed during 3 sessions at Guist Common where 9 were young birds.

The last record was one at Sparham Pools on 27th Sept.

Grasshopper Warbler Locustella naevia

Very scarce summer visitor and passage migrant. **Red listed**. Recorded twice from Scarning on 2nd May and 23rd June (IB).

Blackcap Sylvia atricapilla

Common summer resident, passage migrant and very scarce winter visitor. Green listed.


One recorded from Great Ryburgh on 25th Feb (IB) was probably an over-wintering bird as the main influx started from 4th Apr.

Recorded from 25 localities. Highest counts were in April c15 Sparham Pools on 18th (SCh) and 20+ (at least 6+ pairs) on 23rd (LB). Only proof of breeding came from Guist where 3 young were trapped and ringed.

Two birds in Sparham Pools area on 4th Nov (SCh) were probably the last summer visitors while the 3 seen on HBW on 16th Dec were likely to have over-wintered (DK).

Garden Warbler Sylvia borin

Fairly common summer visitor and passage migrant. **Green listed**. The first record of the year was from Pensthorpe on 9th Apr (PA, MS).



Recorded from 13 localities with the highest count 6 at Pensthorpe on 11th May. The last bird of the year was at Sparham Pools on 10th Sept (SCh).

Lesser Whitethroat Sylvia curruca

Fairly common summer resident and passage migrant. Green listed.

Only 12 records were received from 9 localities. All were singles except for 2 on HBW 19th Aug (DK). The first record was from Sparham Pools on 16th Apr and the last on 27th Aug at Cawston / Marsham Heath both (SCh).

Whitethroat Sylvia communis

Common summer resident. Green listed.

The first record of the year was heard on HBW on 15th Apr (DK).

Records came from only 9 localities with a maximum count of 5 at Pensthorpe on 11^{th} May. Proof of breeding – a juvenile caught at Guist Common on 14^{th} Aug.

The last record was 2 on Cawston / Marsham Heath on 27^{th} Aug (SCh).

Goldcrest Regulus regulus

Common resident, passage migrant and winter visitor. Green listed.

Recorded throughout the year from 11 localities with a maximum count of 6 on St Faith's Common on 21st Nov (PR).

Wren Troglodytes troglodytes

Common resident. Green listed.

Sightings from multiple sights during the year with a maximum of 14 at Pensthorpe on 13th July and 11 at Hoe on 17th June.

Nuthatch Sitta europaea

Fairly common resident. Green listed.

Records from 13 sites during the year with a maximum of 6 at Pensthorpe on 26^{th} Mar.

Treecreeper Certhia familiaris

Fairly common resident. Green listed.

Records from several sites throughout the year with a maximum count of 5 being seen on the Hoe Bird Walk on 15th Apr.

Rose-coloured Starling Pastor roseus

Rare vagrant. A single bird was present at Costessey on 10th/11th Oct (SG, IB).

Starling Sturnus vulgaris Common resident. **Red listed.**

Many records from throughout the valley during the year with the highest count being 5000+ at Swaffham on 25th Feb (IB). A total of 2071 was observed migrating through the Tud valley between 7th Oct & 18th Nov (AG).

Ring Ouzel Turdus torquatus

Very rare passage migrant. Red listed.

Records during April mainly from from Cawston Heath with a maximum of 2 birds seen at a time. One autumn record only, again from Cawston Heath.

Blackbird Turdus merula

Common resident, passage migrant and winter visitor. Green listed.

Recorded throughout the year at many places and with breeding proved at a total at least 8 sites. A high count of 35 at Pensthorpe on Jan 27th.

Fieldfare Turdus pilaris

Common passage migrant and winter visitor. Red listed.

During the 1st winter period a count of 400+ from Gt Witchingham and several more of 150+ from other sites with the last siting of this period being on Apr 20th. During the 2nd period the first record was 22 on Oct 16th and a total of 433 birds were observed moving through the Tud valley between 8th Oct and 18th Nov (AG).

Redwing Turdus iliacus

Common passage migrant and fairly common winter visitor. Red listed.

Counts of 25 on 17th Jan and 42 on 27th Mar were the most notable during the 1st winter period. During the second period, on 18th Oct a peak count of 489 birds was observed migrating through the Tud valley and between 5th Oct and 18th Nov a total of 2004 passed through the same valley (AG). Other notable counts during this period were of 150 on Oct 7th and 138 on Oct 20th at Costessey (SCh.)

Song Thrush Turdus philomelos

Common resident and passage migrant. Red listed.

Single figure counts from many sites throughout the year. Singing male heard at Wellingham, Mill Street, Dereham and Potters Fen.

Mistle Thrush *Turdus viscivorus Fairly common resident.* **Red listed**.

Apart from 15 birds being at Cawston Heath on Aug 27th (SCh) there were only single figure counts which were observed at multiple sites throughout the year. Singing males heard at Lenwade, Wellingham and Neatherd Moor.

Spotted Flycatcher Muscicapa striata

Fairly common but declining summer visitor. Red listed.



First report of the year was at Sculthorpe on May 25th. 2 pairs were at Swanton Morley on June 25th but unfortunately one pair were predated at nest and the outcome of the other pair is unknown.

Last report of the year was from Haveringland on Aug 31st.

Robin Erithacus rubecula

Very common resident. Numbers may be augmented by passage migrants in autumn. **Green listed**.

Multiple records from throughout the valley during the year with proof of breeding noted at Pensthorpe only.

Pied flycatcher Ficedula hypoleuca

Very scarce passage migrant. Red listed.

2 records only, both from Bittering on 1st and 2nd May.

Black Redstart Phoenicurus ochruros

Very scarce passage migrant and winter visitor. **Red listed**. Two records only, one from Reepham Station on Mar 6th and another of a bird singing in Norwich on Jun 17th.

Black Redstart, by Steve Cale

Whinchat Saxicola rubetra Very scarce passage migrant. Red listed.

One record only from Bittering on Apr 26th.

Stonechat Saxicola rubicola

Scarce passage migrant. Green listed.

A maximum of 5 birds present at Marsham Heath on Sept 1st. Also reported from 4 other sites during the year.

Wheatear Oenanthe oenanthe

Scarce passage migrant. Green listed.

Records from 5 sites during the period Apr 15th to Sept 15th. There was a maximum of 3 at Cawston Heath on Apr 26th.

House Sparrow Passer domesticus

Common but declining resident. Red listed.

Reports of flocks of 30+ from several sites during year and proof of breeding from Wellingham, Potters Fen, Neatherd Moor, N Tuddenham and Swanton Morley.

Tree Sparrow Passer montanus

Uncommon declining resident. Red listed.

A report of 2 at Mileham on Aug 6^{th} was the sole record for the year (IB).

Dunnock Prunella modularis

Common sedentary resident. Amber listed.

Single figure counts only from multiple sites throughout the year and proof of breeding from Reepham, Lenwade, N Tuddenham and Potters Fen.

Yellow Wagtail Motacilla flava

Rare passage migrant in valley. Red listed.

One record of a single bird at Bintree Mill on May 2nd and 2 records both of 2 birds at Brandiston on May 3rd and 9th.

Grey Wagtail Motacilla cinerea

Scarce resident. The valley is a stronghold in Norfolk for this species. **Red listed**.

Records from 11 sites throughout the year and proof of breeding from Worthing, Bintree Mill and Swanton Morley.

Pied Wagtail (White Wagtail) Motecilla alba

British form "yarrellii" (Pied Wagtail) common resident and passage migrant. Nominate continental form (White Wagtail) very scarce passage migrant. Both forms **Green listed**.

Sightings from throughout the Valley during the year. Proof of breeding from Rawhall GP and Potters Fen only. High counts of 100+ at Bylaugh on Jan 7th (SCh) and on Jan 20th 300 going to roost at Longwater (AG).

Meadow Pipit Anthus pratensis

Scarce resident and passage migrant. Fairly common winter visitor. Amber listed.

Recorded at only 8 sites with a high count of 10 at Neatherd Moor on Feb 3rd.

Chaffinch Fringilla coelebs

Common resident. Green listed.

Records from throughout the Valley during the year with highest counts coming from 38 at Costessey on Oct 17th and 48 on Dec 13th from Pensthorpe. There was proof of breeding from Pensthorpe only.

Brambling Fringilla montifringilla

Fairly common passage migrant and winter visitor in variable numbers. Green listed.

Twelve recorded on Jan 20th at Great Witchingham otherwise all single figure records for 1st winter period with last record being on April 17th. 1st record for 2nd period was on Oct 7th and a total of 36 birds migrated through the Tud valley from Oct 8th to Nov 22nd.

Hawfinch Coccothraustes coccothraustes

Very scarce resident and passage migrant. Red listed.

 1^{st} winter period records of 16 birds at Swannington on Jan 21^{st} (SB) and 16 at Horsford on Mar 15^{th} (JH). Two records only in 2^{nd} period, both of single birds.

Bullfinch Pyrrhula pyrrhula

Fairly common resident. Amber listed.

Recorded at 19 sites throughout the year with 10 being at Sculthorpe Moor on Jan 7th (SCh) but single figure counts only from everywhere else.

Greenfinch Chloris chloris

Common resident. Green listed.

Sightings from 15+ sites throughout the year but in single figures only.

Linnet Linaria cannabina Fairly common resident. Red listed.

Notable flocks from both winter periods during the year with !20+ being counted at Hoe on Feb $12^{th}/14^{th}$ (DK) and 150 being present at Sparham on Oct 4^{th} (SCh).

Common (Mealy) Redpoll

Acanthis flammea Scarce winter visitor and passage migrant. Amber listed.

Reports from 8 sites all in the 1st winter period and all in single figures apart from 1 notable count of 30 at Cawston Heath on Mar 30th.

Lesser Redpoll (Redpoll)

Acanthis cabaret

Scarce and declining resident and fairly common winter visitor. **Red** *listed*.

Records from 5 sites in both winter periods with high counts of 60 at Cawston Heath in the 1st Period and 32 at Pensthorpe on Nov 23rd.

Arctic Redpoll Acanthis hornemanni

Very rare vagrant.



2 Records for the year only, both from Felthorpe of 3 birds on Mar 31st and 2 on Apr 2nd.

One record only of a single bird at St Faiths Common on Nov 8^{th} (PR).

Very scarce resident and irruptive winter visitor. Green listed. Single record from St Faiths Common on Nov 21st.

Goldfinch Carduelis carduelis

Common resident. Green listed.

Records from many sites throughout the year with several counts of 25+ inc one of 70 at Brandiston on Sept 27th. Proof of breeding came from N Tuddenham, Cawston Heath and Neatherd Moor.

Siskin Spinus spinus

Common or fairly common winter visitor. Green listed.

Several records from both winter periods with high counts mainly from the 1st period of 60 at Pensthorpe on Feb 6th and 40 at Sculthorpe Moor on Feb 6th.

Yellowhammer Emberiza citrinella

Common but declining resident. Red listed.

Recorded throughout but mainly in single figures apart from 25 at Mileham on Jan 17th, 15 at Scarning on Oct 17th and 17 at Sparham on Nov 30th.

Reed Bunting Emberiza schoeniclus

Fairly common resident. Amber listed.

Very low single figure counts only with a maximum of 7 recorded at Pensthorpe on Dec 19th. Proof of breeding from Pensthorpe on Jun 14th.

Escapes

These species have been recorded in the area but are clearly not native and it is assumed that it they have not reached Britain by their own effort.

Ruddy Shelduck Tadorna ferruginea

Balkans east through C Asia, N Africa. Winters S to Nile valley, India & China.

One record only from Pensthorpe on Dec 13th.

WVBS 2018 Ringing Report

Selected WVBS Recoveries Notified During 2018

Greylag Goose

Adult17 – Nov - 2010Whitlingham Broad, NorwichRing read in field20 – Jan – 2018Wensum Park, Norwich (4km)

At 7yr 2 mon this is still far short of the oldest recorded of 19+ years. It had been reported 3 times at Whitlingham Broad prior to 2018

Mallard

Adult Female18 - Feb - 2010East LexhamShot16 - Jan - 2018West Lexham (1km)

At 7yr 10 mon 29 day this is still far short of the oldest recorded of 20+ years.

Teal

Adult male11 – Feb – 2017LitchamHit by car11 – Jan – 2018near Mileham (2km)Surely an unusual demise for a Teal.

Black-headed Gull

First year30 – Dec – 1996NorwichLive ring read31 – Nov – 2018Huizen, The Netherlands (272km)This bird has been recorded nearly every winter since 1999 at Huizen

and at 21yr 10mon 1 day is by far the oldest recorded in our area but well short of the 32+ year record.

Little Owl

2 adult females have been retrapped at the nest for the last 5 years in Elsing and 4 years in Briston. The longevity record is 13yr 10 mon.

Very few nestling Sand Martins are ringed. Assume it was from an artificial nestbox.

Sand Martins frequently change breeding colonies.

Sedge Warbler

Adult male 16 – May – 2013 Pensthorpe Caught by ringer 16 – June – 2018 Pensthorpe

This bird was retrapped at Pensthorpe every of the 5 years since first capture. A good example of site fidelity.

Reed Warbler

Adult female4 – July – 2011PensthorpeCaught by ringer16 – June – 2018Pensthorpe

This bird was retrapped at Pensthorpe every one of the 7 years (except 2017) since first capture. Another good example of site fidelity.

First Year 30 – July – 2016 Guist Common

Caught by ringer 22 – July – 2018 Litlington, East Sussex

This bird was re-trapped on passage to Africa demonstrating how early our summer visitors can depart.

Blackcap

First year male 30 – June – 2010 Shereford

Caught by ringer 12 - May - 2012 Kettlestone

Caught by ringer 7 – Apr – 2018 Kettlestone

At 7y 9m 8d this bird is still a fair way off the oldest recorded at 10y 8m 15 d.

Robin

First year29 – Mar – 2017Nidingen, Halland, SwedenKilled by cat22 – Jan – 2018Mattishall (864km SW)Scandinavian Robins move SW in winter.

Brambling

First year male 11 – Dec – 2016 Kettlestone Ring read in field 13 – Mar – 2018 Saint-Mars-La- Briere, Sarthe, France (843km S) Brambling can winter in different areas, even countries.

Common Redpoll

First year22 - Feb - 2018HemptonCaught by ringer3 - Apr - 2018Edwinstowe, Notts (132km WNW)

Siskin

First year male 30 – Mar – 2018 Little Barningham Caught by ringer 9 – Apr – 2018 Cnoc, Argyll and Butte (531km NW) A rapid movement back to its breeding area.

Report on Monitoring of Common Terns & Black-headed Gulls at NWT and Sparham Hall Farm Lakes for 2018

The monitoring of Common Terns and Black-headed Gulls at Sparham in 2018 included the NWT island and raft plus the island and the 2 rafts at Sparham Hall Farm.

As well as the Tern Rafts being cleaned the island on the adjacent trout lake was cleared of vegetation for the arrival of the Common Terns. This strategy was adopted to attract any Common Terns usurped by Black-headed Gull from the NWT island.

A new strategy was adopted in 2018 by removing the rafts from the lake over winter and delaying their return until the first Common Terns were seen at Sparham. Meanwhile Charles Sayer's island was cleared of vegetation to attract the Black-headed Gull to nest and settle down there. As will be seen later this strategy worked well for the Common Terns, if not the Gulls.

8th May

The 2 rafts on Charles Sayer's lake were returned to the lake and covered with new shingle.

7th June

The Original Raft

Common Tern - 9 nests:- 3 x 3 eggs; 3 x 2 eggs; 2 x 1 egg and 1 x 1 egg + 1 chick.

Black-headed Gull – 7 nests:- 1 x 5 eggs (2 of which were quite blue?); 3 x 3 eggs; 1 x 2 eggs; 1 x 1 egg + 1 chick and 1 x 2 eggs + 1 chick.

The New Wooden Raft

Common Tern - 12 nests: 4 x 3 eggs; 2 x 2 eggs; 1 x 1 egg; 2 x 1 egg + 1 chick; 1 x 2 eggs + 1 chick; 1 x 1 egg and 2 chicks and 1 x 3 chicks. Also 1 dead chick.

Black-headed Gull – 1 nest with 2 eggs.

So a total of 21 Common Tern nests and 8 Black-headed Gull nests were on the 2 rafts. None of the chicks were large enough to ring.

It does raise the question whether the birds prefer the open visibility of the wire walls on the new raft to the solid walls on the original raft.

Charles's Island

Only 1 nest of an Oystercatcher with 3 eggs. The island was covered in goose guano which itself or the geese's presence may have put off the terns and gulls.

NWT Island

Common Tern - there was no evidence of breeding

Black-headed Gull – it was not possible to count the nests but there were approximately 80 chicks of which 50 were ringed, 6 – 8 were too young to ring and 3 were dead. In addition there was a total 16 eggs in 5 nests. Also a Mallard nest with 12 eggs.

NWT Raft

This was unoccupied.

18th June

The Rafts

32 Common Tern and 9 Black-headed Gull chicks were ringed. In addition there was 1 Common Tern nest with 1 chick and 1 egg plus 3 further eggs.

7 Black-headed Gulls were too small to ring and there were 7 eggs.

Neither the NWT or Charles' islands were visited as there was clearly nothing on the former and too much disturbance would have been made to the latter at this stage.

Conclusions

The strategy of removing the rafts from the lake and not returning them before the first Common Terns are seen at the site has proved very

successful with c36 Common Terns fledging. Taking the site as a whole this has been the most successful for many years for the Common Terns without adversely affecting the Black-headed Gulls.

Plans for 2019 Season


Continue to clear Charles's island and also the NWT Island, if required, and launch the rafts as in 2018. In the meantime considerable work needs to be done to the new wooden raft, which has rotted badly, if it is to be fit for use in 2019.

Norfolk Ornithologists' Association – 2018 Hempton Marsh Report

As always, credit must go to the volunteers and visitors to the reserve who, once again enabled a comprehensive record to be collected of the birds, insects and mammals seen here during the year.

Birds

The first visit in **January** occurred on the 5th with 2 Nuthatches and a Marsh Tit visiting the feeders whilst on the marsh Grey Heron, 2 Egyptian Geese, 4 Shelducks, 4 Mallards and 16 Teal were noted. Fifty Blackheaded Gulls were around the marsh on the 6th and a Great Spotted Woodpecker was heard calling on the 11th. The first Treecreeper of the year was seen on the 12th with Buzzard overhead. On the 13th 7 Bramblings were of note with in excess of 100 Jackdaws seen heading to roost.

Two Marsh Tit, Nuthatch and Great Spotted Woodpecker were recorded on the 18th and interest on the 20th included 20 Goldfinches, 2 Siskins, Jay, 2 Egyptian Geese, 2 Greylag Geese, Grey Heron and 2 Common Buzzard over. Ten Pink-footed Geese were unusual on the 26th on an interesting day with Water Rail, 3 Nuthatch, 2 Redpolls, 4 Goldcrests, 2 Treecreepers, 65 Starlings, 40 Goldfinches, 5 Siskins, 2 Mistle Thrushes and 9 Redwing recorded. The first Little Grebe of the year was heard on the 30th.

Seven Blackbirds were feeding under the boardwalk on the 1st and 2 Marsh Tits were visiting feeders on the 2nd as **February** arrived. A Buzzard and 13 Pheasants were on the marsh on the 3rd and 4 Mute Swans were seen along the river. Five Siskins, a Greenfinch, Meadow Pipit and 2 Woodcocks were all of interest on the 5th and on the 6th 18 Redwings, 9 Fieldfares, Woodcock and 2 Teal were recorded. Two pairs of Bullfinches were working their way through the riverside Willows on the 8th with 9 Brambling feeding on the ground near the boardwalk. On the 16th 4 Red-legged Partridge were on the marsh and birds visiting the feeders included 10 Siskins, 2 Lesser Redpolls, 30 Chaffinches and Bullfinch; overhead were 50 Redwings.

A single Redpoll was present on the 18th and the obvious highlight on the 21st was a Peregrine Falcon late afternoon, powering west up the valley. Three Grey Herons, 3 Lesser Redpoll, 40 Siskins, 2 Treecreepers, 5 Redwings and 2 Pied Wagtails were also noted on the same date. At least 8 Mealy Redpolls and 2 Lesser Redpolls were visiting the feeders on the 22nd, with 30 Siskins, Mistle Thrush, 8 Greylag Geese, a big female Sparrowhawk and a male Bullfinch providing the rest of the interest. A Red Kite drifted over the entrance on the 23rd and a minimum of 40 Chaffinches were feeding on the ground around the feeders, with 30 Goldfinches and 2 Siskins feeding busily in the tops of the Alders.

The intense cold and thick snow cover at the beginning of March made it relatively simple to locate species usually difficult to count, out on the marsh; 24 Teal, 14 Woodcocks, 6 Common Snipe and a Jack Snipe were seen using small patches of sheltered, bare ground and open water on the 1st and birds on the feeders included 3 Redpolls, 40 Goldfinches, 8 Chaffinches, 20 Siskins and 3 Marsh Tits. A Fieldfare and Marsh Harrier were noted on the 2nd and 3 Redwing and a Woodcock on the 3rd. The first Green Woodpecker of the year was heard on the 5th when Brambling, 8 Siskins, 3 Redpolls, Mealy Redpoll, 16 Chaffinches, 2 Redwings, 30 Goldfinches, Song Thrush and a Lesser Black-backed Gull were also of interest.

Two Lapwings, Siskin and Redpoll were the best of the 8th and single Woodocks were noted on the 14th and 16th. A Barn Owl was hunting in the late afternoon on the 14th with a Moorhen also heard calling from the river. The first Chiffchaffs were recorded on the 26th when a Cetti's Warbler was also singing from the meander; Green Woodpecker and 4 Jays were heard and 18 Siskins were visiting feeders – rising to 30 on the 28th. Ten Chaffinches, 6 Lesser Redpolls and a Mealy Redpoll were seen on the same date and 20 Redwing were around on the 29th when the Cetti's Warbler was heard again.

Good counts at the start of **April** included 82 Black-headed Gulls, Mediterranean Gull and 8 Herring Gulls bathing and feeding on the flooded marsh and around the rest of the reserve, 18 Siskins, 4 Redpolls, 10 Chaffinches, 2 Reed Buntings, 3 Chiffchaffs and Stock Dove visiting a nest box. Three Shovelers, 2 Gadwalls and 8 Teal were using the flood on the 5th and 2 pairs of Reed Bunting were seen on the 7th. Four Common Gulls and a Pied Wagtail were of interest on the 9th and as the first Willow Warbler arrived on the 13th, lingering winter visitors included 6 Lesser Redpolls, 3 Mealy Redpolls, 4 Siskins and 4 Redwings. Two Blackcaps had returned by the 19th when Oystercatcher, 3 Chiffchaffs, Willow Warbler, Green Woodpecker and Little Grebe were all heard whilst a Grey Heron was still feeding regularly on the marsh to the 26th.

The Cetti's Warbler was still holding territory into **May**, heard throughout the day on the 3rd. The first Cuckoo and Sedge Warbler were heard on the 4th and 3 Moorhens were seen on the 5th. Willow Warbler, Chiffchaff, Blackcap and Song Thrush were all singing on the 9th when a Treecreeper was seen collecting nesting material.

Six Greylag Geese were near the scrape on the 10th with Cuckoo and Green Woodpecker heard again and 5 Swifts overhead. The first Swallow was heard on the 17th, 4 Canada Geese and a Bullfinch were present on the 18th and 2 Garden Warblers were singing on the 24th, when a Barn Owl was seen hunting at dawn. Singles of Cuckoo and Garden Warbler were heard again on the 31st when 3 Chiffchaffs and 2 Blackcaps were still singing.

Chiffchaffs, Blackcap and Willow Warbler were recorded on the 1st and 2nd of **June**, heading into a typically quiet period. Green and Great Spotted Woodpecker were also in evidence and 3 juvenile Robins were seen on the 5th with Grey Heron still being seen on the marsh and Sedge Warbler singing near the entrance. Two Cuckoos were heard on the 7th with 3 Jays and Little Grebe noted on the same date and on the 14th 2 Marsh Tits, Garden Warbler, Song Thrush, 2 House Martins, Swift and Cuckoo were of interest.

A Red Kite came through high on the 21st and a Greenfinch was present on the 25th along with Kingfisher, Reed Bunting, Bullfinch, Mistle Thrush, 4 Blackcaps, 3 Chiffchaffs and the first Reed Warbler of the year. Two Stock Doves were feeding amongst the cows on the 28th and a Kestrel was hunting over the marsh on the 30th.

Two recently fledged Blackcaps were in a Hawthorn by the meander on the 3rd and Little Grebe was still being heard on the river at the start of **July**. A Red Kite drifted over again on the 5th and a single Swift was hawking on the 12th. Three Swifts and a Red Kite were over the marsh on the 19th with Buzzard, Jay and Moorhen also seen and on the 26th a Great Spotted Woodpecker was visiting the feeders.

The warm, settled weather dampened activity on most visits during the summer and this continued as **August** got underway - Chiffchaff, Moorhen and Jay were recorded on the 2nd and Treecreeper on the 3rd. A Grey Heron was in the drainage channel on the 10th and on the 11th 4 Swallows and 7 House Martins were feeding over the marsh. Green Woodpecker, Pied Wagtail and Great Spotted Woodpecker were seen on the 14th and birds visiting the feeders on the 23rd included Coal Tit, Nuthatch, Marsh Tit and Jay whilst a Kestrel was seen hunting near the river. A Swallow and 6 House Martins were present on the 25th and on the 31st a Common Buzzard and Jay were the best, whilst a Magpie and Kestrel sparring from the marsh hide provided welcome interest.

Six Black-headed Gulls, Grey Heron and Common Buzzard were on the marsh on the 4th, and Kestrels were recorded on every other visit through **September**, with two birds present on the 6th and 13th when a family party of Long-tailed Tits was feeding in the low vegetation by the river. A Swallow and Grey Heron were seen from the marsh hide on the 20th and interest on the 22nd included 2 Common Buzzards, 4 House Martins and a Lesser Black-backed Gull.

A male Sparrowhawk showed well on the 25^{th} in trees above the feeding station where 2 Nuthatches were present and on the 27^{th} highlights included a Red Kite, 3 Red-legged Partridges and Little Grebe. Visiting the feeders on the 28^{th} were Nuthatch, Marsh Tit, Treecreeper, Jay and 2 Coal Tits.

Variety finally increased at the start of **October** with a Pied Wagtail and Grey Heron noted on the 1st. Two Kestrels were seen on the 4th and 100 Jackdaws flew south towards their roost in the afternoon; A Common Buzzard, 2 Collared Doves, Kingfisher and Common Gull were also of interest. A small increase in Blackbirds recorded on the 12th saw 14 birds around the reserve and a Common Gull was on the marsh again on the 15th. Birds visiting the feeders on the 18th included 2 Coal Tits, 2 Marsh Tits, a male Great Spotted Woodpecker, 5 Chaffinches and Goldfinch, whilst Little Grebe, Moorhen and Grey Heron were seen on the river. Two Marsh Tits, 2 Nuthatches, 3 Chaffinches and 4 Jays were seen on the 20th and a Sparrowhawk, Common Gull and Common Buzzard were seen on the 20th. Two Red Kites were the best of the 25th.

Signs of passage at the end of the month saw 4 Meadow Pipits, 18 Blackbirds, 2 Mistle Thrushes, 60 Redwings, 3 Fieldfares, 3 Goldcrests, 10 Starlings, 5 or more Siskins, 2 Mealy Redpolls and a Bullfinch recorded on the 31st whilst local interest included 2 Common Buzzards, Sparrowhawk, 2 Great Spotted Woodpeckers, 2 Nuthatches, Marsh Tit, 2 Treecreepers and 2 Jays.

Moorhen, Little Grebe, Mallard, 5 Blackbirds and 11 Jackdaws were the best of the 1st as **November** began. A Kingfisher was fishing from the fenceline on the 3rd and singles of Red-legged Partridge and Grey Heron were recorded on the 7th. Ten Red-legged Partridge were seen on the 8th and seasonal interest included 2 Woodcocks, 4 Redwings and 3 Song Thrushes overhead.

Ten Goldfinches and 25 Red-legged Partridge were recorded on the 14th and a single Fieldfare on the 15th when 4 Common Gulls were on the marsh and a Cormorant was fishing on the river. Great Spotted Woodpecker, 2 Nuthatches, Treecreeper, Marsh Tit and 2 Chaffinches were visiting the feeding station on the 23rd and several hundred Jackdaws flew over from roost on the 29th. A Kingfisher was present again on the 30th with other interest including 10 Long-tailed Tits, Meadow Pipit, 4 Fieldfares, Woodcock and a Tawny Owl calling from the island.

A mild start to **December** kept the feeding station relatively quiet with local birds providing all the interest. On the 1st Nuthatch, Marsh Tit, 3 Long-tailed Tits, 3 Blackbirds, Jay, Bullfinch and 7 Starlings were the highlights. Two Goldcrests were noted on the 6th with a Red-legged Partridge on the marsh. A Woodcock and 2 Mute Swans were seen on the 7th with Woodcock recorded again on the 8th when a Kestrel was seen. Green Woodpecker was heard on the 10th when 10 Goldfinches and 10 Siskins were present in the canopy and a single Siskin was heard on the 20th when 10 Chaffinches and 8 Goldfinches were feeding in the area. The Green Woodpecker was heard again on the final 2 visits of the year, the 24th and 26th when 10 Chaffinches, 30 Goldfinches, 3 Siskins, Great Spotted Woodpecker and 2 Egyptian Geese provided the only other interest.

Insects

Eight species of Odonata and sixteen species of butterfly were recorded this year, unsurprisingly the season started late but many species were seen in good numbers after their first emergence and for an extended period.

No invertebrates were recorded in March, but after their absence last year Brimstones (*Gonepteryx rhamni*) were recorded on most visits through spring from the 7th April. The first Peacock (*Inachis io*) was seen on the 19th and Orange-tips (*Anthocharis cardamines*) and Small Tortoiseshells (*Aglais urticae*) were regular from the 21st.

The first Large Red Damselflies (*Pyrrhosoma nymphula*) were out on the 3rd May and Speckled Woods (*Pararge aegaria*) were seen from the 5th. Small Whites (*Pieris rapae*) were seen from the 9th and the first Banded Demoiselles (*Calopteyx splendens*) on the 24th, whilst an early Large White (*Pieris brassicae*) was seen on the 26th.

Azure Damsefly (*Coenagrion puella*) and Common Blue Damselfly (*Enallagma cyathigerum*) were recorded from the 7th June and the first Comma (*Polygona c-album*) was seen on the 28th. Ringlets (*Enallagma cyathigerum*) were abundant from the 30th onwards.

Red Admirals (*Vanessa atalanta*) were noted from the 3rd July and Large Skippers (*Ochlodes sylvanus*) were seen for a short period from the 5th. The first Green-veined White (*Pieris napi*) wasn't recorded until the 12th of July when Meadow Browns (*Maniola jurtina*) were also first noted. Gatekeepers (*Pyronia tithonus*) were seen in small numbers from the 13th whilst Small Copper (*Lycaena phlaeas*) and Ruddy Darter (*Sympetrum sanguineum*) were out from the 19th.

The first Small Skippers (*Thymelicus sylvestris*) of the year were out on the 14th August. New species in September included Common Darter (*Sympetrum striolatum*) on the 4th and Southern Hawker (*Aeshna cyanea*) seen from the 13th. Common Darters were on show right through to November, with 12 still on the wing on the 8th.

A number of Bitter-cress Diamond-back (*Eidophasia messingiella*) came to light at the reserve on the 3rd July, proving to be a fairly scarce moth in Norfolk.

The hot summer provided great numbers and added variety for moth trapping throughout the country in 2018, and a very successful catch at the annual moth event on the 21st July produced 506 moths of 124 species. Highlights included 2 Garden Tigers (*Arctia caja*), 3 Crescent (*Helotropha leucostigma*), Small Seraphim (*Pterapherapteryx sexalata*), Bulrush Wainscot (*Nonagria typhae*), Ghost Moth (*Hepialus humuli*) and Hemp Agrimony Plume (*Adaina microdactyla*). High counts included 41 Smoky Wainscot (*Mythimna impure*), 12 Fen Wainscot (*Arenostola phragmitidis*) and 37 Mother of Pearl (*Patania ruralis*).

Mammals

A very quiet year for mammal records with no Bank Voles (*Myodes glareolus*) or Brown Rats (*Rattus norvegicus*) recorded. Up to 3 Grey Squirrels (*Sciurus carolinensis*) were seen regularly throughout the year and Muntjac (*Muntiacus reevesi*) were recorded on most visits with a high count of 5 on the 1st March. Water Voles were seen on 3 visits in early April.

Pensthorpe Natural Park 2018 Wildlife Report

2018 has seen a significant change in the way recording is dealt with at Pensthorpe Natural Park. Records are now held within a specialist database that allows much greater access to and comparison of information.

This has given us the opportunity to input many of the older records including all of the old WVBS data which have previously sat in individual spreadsheets going back as far as 2013, giving us greater understanding of historical records and potential changing trends.

In 2018 we recorded a total of 601 species including 131 species of bird, 165 species of plant, 161 species of moth, 23 butterflies, 18 odonata and with a lichen survey we recorded 54 species of lichen to add to our list.

Birds included our regular visitors but also a couple of unusual sightings. Osprey was reported in 30th June passing over, Honey Buzzard on the 6th Aug, only a single Crane record of fifteen birds flying over on 29th August, Great White Egret visited us on 14th to 17th September (in 2017 a bird visited on 15th to 19th September) and Short-eared Owl was seen one evening on 18th December, the first for a number of years.

However, we also had several birds of an uncertain origin turn up. The first, White Stork, was seen on 26th March but was reported to be from released stock while on 8th November a single Ferruginous Duck appeared with Tufted Duck for only a few hours during which time it was ascertained to have no rings.

Arrival dates for returning birds and summer arrivals were Avocet on 9th March, Chiffchaff on 21st March, Swallow on 5th April, Willow Warbler on 9th April, Cuckoo 19th April and Swift on 24th April.

Other wildlife of note particularly highlighted odonata with sightings of Willow Emerald and Small Red-eyed Damselfly on the reserve and Silverwashed Fritillary and White Admiral butterfly.

Worryingly only one sighting of Water Vole was recorded this year. Given its former regular presence on the river this is of concern and may be related to river level heights.

Pensthorpe Constant Effort Site

For the thirteenth year running the NOA carried out ringing for the Constant Effort Site (CES) study at Pensthorpe.

During the breeding season between May and August, standardized data collected from Pensthorpe and the other CES sites throughout the country (approximately 140 in total) provides an accurate measure of changes in bird abundance. Recaptures of birds ringed in previous years also allow survival rates to be calculated. The ratio of juvenile to adult birds caught on CESs provides a second measure of breeding success, that also takes into account the number of successful breeding attempts made per adult (as many species attempt to rear more than one brood per season), and the survival of young birds immediately after fledging. CES covers 24 woodland, scrub and reedbed species. As would be expected, the weather plays a major part in the survival and breeding success of our birds and hence the CES results.

DATA FROM PENSTHORPE CES 2018

The number of new birds caught this year (217) was well down against the previous year's total (298) which as mentioned last year is a long way off the heady heights of the 348 new birds in 2014. When comparing captures of new and retrapped birds collectively, as opposed to just new birds, the figure is 304, again a drop on last year's figure of 376. A degree of the decline can be attributed to the fact we only managed eleven of the twelve allowed main visits this year as opposed to twelve the year before. Catching conditions were generally good from a weather perspective, though there were some concerns over the general maturing of the ringing site. This has resulted in the surrounding vegetation in some places becoming higher than the nets. A degree of management is allowed under the rules of the project and credit to the team at Pensthorpe is due as management work has already been carried out to try to address this. As with last year it is difficult to comment too much on the value of the data we collected for the project if only looking at Pensthorpe alone, its value is being part of the data collected nationally. That said, if we look at the species we used as comparisons locally last year, all the species that had showed an encouraging increase last year have dropped, with the exception of Willow Warbler to some of the lowest numbers ever! These species are listed next, with this year's total and the previous two years for comparison : Willow Warbler ($7 \vee 11 \vee 9$), Chiffchaff ($11 \vee 47 \vee 20$), Greenfinch ($2 \vee 9 \vee 4$) and Blue Tit ($17 \vee 53 \vee 29$). Looking at the other species we compared last year, that had dropped last year to 2015/16 levels, namely Reed and Garden Warbler, Blackcap and Wren, their numbers were virtually identical again this year, and unfortunately showed little sign of increasing.

COMPARISON WITH BREEDING BIRD SURVEY DATA 2018

To put the results from Pensthorpe into a wider context, a comparison may be made with the results of the 2018 Breeding Bird Survey, published in May 2019 by the British Trust for Ornithology, on behalf of a partnership involving BTO, RSPB and the Joint Nature Conservation Committee (JNCC).

The Survey report concluded that the Beast from the East in early March had big effects on some of our resident species, while strong winds in the Sahara may have had a detrimental effect on some of our summer migrants. Although the duration of the Beast from the East was short, our smallest birds were particularly vulnerable, with Goldcrests, Wrens and Long-tailed Tits showing population declines of 38%, 21% and 22%, respectively, in 2018 compared with the previous year. Owing to the sudden freezing of shallow water, Kingfishers were also affected, suffering a 38% population decline compared with 2017.

Although our summer visitors were mostly still in sub-Saharan Africa when the Beast struck, subsequent strong northerly winds apparently hampered northbound journeys, so that many species arrived late or in lower numbers than usual. The Breeding Bird Survey showed population declines for House Martin, Sand Martin and Swift of 17%, 42% and 20%, respectively. Two of our commonest warblers were down as well, Whitethroat by 18% and Willow Warbler by 23%. It is unknown whether local conditions on wintering grounds contributed to these declines.

But not all the news was bad. In contrast to some other species, Cuckoos arrived back in the UK on schedule, and their population increased by 22% compared with 2017, partly reversing a long-term decline of 41% between 1995 and 2017.

SECOND SITE AT PENSTHORPE

As in previous years, extra nets were erected when time and manpower allowed, adjacent to the CES site. This resulted in a further 100 birds being ringed, this total including 14 Reed Warblers, 23 Blackcaps, six Chiffchaffs, five Willow Warblers and single Garden Warbler, Goldcrest, Jay and Bullfinch. Disappointingly no Kingfishers were caught this year, though two were caught during the season on the main CES site. Activities away from the usual extra ringing area resulted in a Green Sandpiper caught and ringed on the wader scrape, plus four Mute Swans 'corralled' and ringed. Four pulli (three Black-headed Gulls and an Oystercatcher) were also ringed.



All observers are requested to **submit records on a monthly basis** as this helps considerably with managing the workload and speeding up production of the Report. If it is not possible to submit records until the end of the year, this should be done **by the 31st Jan 2020.** Late records cause considerable problems in drafting the Systematic List and their inclusion cannot be guaranteed if received after this deadline. Where possible, observers are also asked to **submit records by email using the Society's records sheet**. This will enable records to be imported straight into the main spreadsheet thus reducing the work load. If this is not possible then records should be submitted by hard copy using the Society's Record Sheets which are available at indoor meetings or can be downloaded from the Society's website <u>www.wvbs.co.uk</u> which also has submission details.

National and County Rarities

National rarities are dealt with by the *British Birds* Rarities Committee (BBRC). A full list of species and forms considered by BBRC as well as full details of requirements, procedures and a downloadable reporting form are available on the BBRC website <u>www.bbrc.org.uk</u>.

Species and forms considered rare at county level are dealt with by the County Records Committee. A full list of species or forms requiring descriptions and the details of requirements and procedures can be found on the CBC website http://norfolkbirds.weebly.com

All records of rarities should be submitted as soon as possible after the sighting.


National rarities accepted by the BBRC and county rarities accepted by the CRC will be published in the Report together with the initials of the finder / identifier.
